

Three Reminders for Our New Year By John Martin, Secretary

As each new year dawns, ACE members are reminded of three important activities. One of them is mandatory; the other two are voluntary.

The mandatory duty is paying the annual dues. It's \$20 for those in the U.S. and, because of higher postage for mailing the monthly newsletter, those in other countries are asked to pay \$25.

A family membership is available for the same price as a single member. Each family member will be assigned their own ACE membership number but just one copy of each monthly newsletter will be sent to the family.

Anyone may send extra funds to ACE if they wish. Those who do so will have the initial "P" for patron added to their listing in the ACE Roster.

The annual roster is published usually in the spring, by which time most members who plan to stay in the club have paid their dues. However, dues are due as of Jan. 1 and prompt payment is expected. This also makes it easier for Joe Doles, who prints and mails the roster as well as the newsletter.

The other two first-of-the-year activities are voluntary, but they are very important, and members are encouraged to participate by nominating someone for the honor of Member of the Year (MOY) or one of their 2024 covers for Cover of the Year (COY).

Member of the Year is an honor bestowed annually to recognize a member's extraordinary service and dedication to ACE. The criteria used to define those terms is recognized by individual ACE members, who then notify the secretary of their nomination and provide a statement (usually a paragraph) about why they believe a certain person is worthy of the honor.

These nominations should be made by Feb. 15 at the very latest.

The other activity is Cover of the

Year. Please look back through the covers you have received in 2024. If you find one that you believe is deserving of being declared the Cover of the Year, using whatever criteria you choose, then please send either a scan of the cover or the cover itself to Joe Doles. If you send in the cover, Joe will scan it and then return it to you.

If you mail a COY candidate to Joe, email him and let him know it's on the way, as mail delivery is sometimes slow.

These nominations should be in Joe's hands by Feb. 15, too. They can be hand-drawn, computer covers, stickers or any other medium. Any type of cover that is made by an ACEr and sent to another ACEr is eligible.

When Joe mails out the February newsletter, it will show the nominations for MOY and COY and will also include a postcard ballot which needs to be filled out and mailed to the ballot counter whose name and address will be designated on the post card.







Memories from ACE#01, Chris Glessner Kirk

From what my family told me, Grandad, our name for Leonard Turley, he was lonely and artistic. He so enjoyed receiving envelopes from people in his stamp collecting group but really wanted to also correspond. Hence the beginning of ACE. It was April, 1985. My youngest aunt had just given birth to her daughter during my spring break from high school. She and I have always been more like sisters due to our slight age difference. So, I offered to spend the week with her and her husband to help out. While there, I spent time looking over her collection of my Great Grandfather's ACE collection of covers. To see that one letter, sent with love and admiration, oh so long ago, has brought together so many people from every background and walk of life. That's why ACE was started by my Great Grandfather. Many ACErs have topics they like to collect under their name in the roster: If you were active member again, what topics would you like to collect? Nothing political!! Hahaha. Anything nature related.






